Rabbi Arnold Saltzman, Principal Rabbi

Rabbi Saltzman is one of the best known religious leaders in the greater Washington region. He is Cantor Emeritus of the Adas Israel Congregation of Washington, DC

where he served for twenty-seven years. Well known as a singer, composer, youth choir director, and educator, Rabbi Saltzman has lectured at the Smithsonian, 6th and I Historic Synagogue, the Kennedy Center, and the National Cathedral. Rabbi Saltzman was ordained after four years of study at the Academy for Jewish Religion and Rabbinical Seminary International by Rabbi Joseph Gelberman. He holds a Master of Arts in Music from Teachers College, Columbia University, a Bachelor of Arts from Brooklyn College of the City University of New York, and he was ordained a Cantor in 1980 by the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. Rabbi Saltzman is a member of both the Cantors Assembly and the American Conference of Cantors, and the International Federation of Rabbis.

Caron is a recording artist and has led family services at Adas Israel Congregation, and the Gan Hayed in Washington, DC. I have known her for many years as a teacher to her children, as a colleague, and I am delighted that she is cantorial soloist for our congregation. She brings a joyful presence, a deep sense of Jewish tradition, a wealth

the Happy Cooker:*

Barbara's Sweet and Sour Meatballs

Sauce:

- 1 onion diced
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1 can of Rokeach tomato sauce with mushrooms

Meatballs:

- Ground Meat 1 1/2 lb (Beef, Chicken or Turkey)
- Matzo Meal 2/3 cup
- Water 1/2 cup
- Egg 1
- Salt and Pepper 1 tsp each

Preparation:

1. Mix meat together with the other ingredients in the meatball list.
2. Form into balls.
3. Brown balls in the oven at 300 degrees Fahrenheit moving them around in the pan until brown.
4. While balls are browning mix together the ingredients listed under sauce.
5. Put sauce in a covered pot and warm.
6. Add meatballs to the sauce and cook in a covered pot for approx. 1 1/2 hours. Begin cooking at medium heat and turn down if the sauce bubbles.
